Statement of directors' responsibilities in respect of the financial review and the regulated entity financial statement

Regulation (EC) No 550/2004 for the provision of air navigation services in the single European sky provides that air navigation service providers shall draw up, submit to audit and publish their financial accounts. These financial statements, prepared by the Irish Aviation Authority ("IAA"), are separate and distinct from those required to be prepared pursuant to the Companies Act, 2014. The content and format of the financial statement was agreed between the Irish Aviation Authority and the Commission for Aviation Regulation ("CAR"), as National Supervisory Authority, in April 2023. For the year ended 31 December 2022 and up to 30 April 2023, the air navigation service provider division of the IAA was the air navigation service provider in Ireland. As a legal entity, the IAA was the Regulated Entity. From 1 May 2023, pursuant to the Air Navigation and Transport Act 2022, the IAA was restructured whereby its air navigation services functions were transferred to a new commercial semi-State Company, the Irish Air Navigation Service ("IANS") trading as AirNav Ireland. Thus, from 1 May 2023, the IANS is now the Regulated Entity for the purposes of Regulation (EC) No 550/2004.

The Commission for Aviation Regulation ("CAR") was the statutory body established to regulate, inter alia, certain aspects of the aviation sector in Ireland. From 1 January 2020, CAR was designated as a National Supervisory Authority (NSA) for economic regulation of air navigation in Ireland under the performance and charging schemes of the single European sky – Commission Implementing Regulation (EU) 2019/317 laying down a performance and charging scheme in the single European sky. Pursuant to the Air Navigation and Transport Act 2022, CAR was dissolved from 1 May 2023 and its aviation regulatory functions were transferred with the aviation regulatory functions of the IAA.

Prior to dissolution, in order for CAR to fulfil its national supervisory authority obligations under the EU performance and charging scheme, it requested that the Irish Aviation Authority prepare a financial statement showing its regulated activities (Regulated Entity financial statement) separate from its other activities, made up to a year-end date of 31 December 2022, the same date to which the statutory accounts of the Company are made up. Extracts from the Regulated Entity financial statement may be published.

The directors of the IAA are responsible for preparing the Regulated Entity financial statement up to 31 December 2022. The Regulated Entity financial statement for the year ended 31 December 2022 is the last regulated entity financial statement to be prepared by the IAA.

The Regulated Entity financial statement of profit and loss account, accounting policies and associated notes represents an extract from the statutory financial statements of the Irish Aviation Authority for the year ending 31 December 2022. The financial statement has been prepared solely to present annual results for the Regulated Entity, based on the statutory financial statements as already reported for the IAA for the year ending 31 December 2022. It has been prepared in accordance with the statement of accounting policies on pages 11 to 14 to present fairly the profit and loss account attributable to the Regulated Entity.

In preparing the regulated entity financial statement, the directors are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent; and
- state whether applicable Accounting Standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statement.

The directors are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the assets, liabilities, financial position and profit or loss of the IAA, of which the Regulated Entity previously formed a part, and which enable them to ensure that the financial statements of the company, from which the Regulated Entity financial statement has been derived, comply with statutory requirements. They have general responsibility for taking such steps as are reasonably open to them to safeguard the assets of the Company and to prevent and detect fraud and other irregularities.

Statement of directors' responsibilities (continued)

The directors are responsible for establishing and maintaining the system of internal control throughout the company, of which the Regulated Entity was a part prior to its transfer to IANS. In 2022, the directors of the IAA were responsible for a system of internal controls to enable the company to comply with Commission Implementing Regulation (EU) 2019/317 which apply to the company's former regulated activities. The system of internal control comprises the ongoing processes for identifying, evaluating and managing significant risks faced by the IAA in pursuing its business objectives. Such a system is designed to manage rather than eliminate the risk of failure and therefore can only provide reasonable and not absolute assurance that the IAA will achieve those objectives or that the IAA would not suffer material misstatement or loss.

Financial review for the year ended 31 December 2022

In May 2022, the State, following a decision issued by the European Commission on 13 April 2022 on the consistency of the performance targets contained in Ireland's draft performance plan with the Union-wide performance targets, adopted Ireland's performance plan for the third reference period 2020 to 2024 ("RP3"). The performance plan meets the requirements of Commission Implementing Regulation (EU) 2019/317 laying down a performance and charging scheme in the single European sky.

The following financial review compares the actual regulated activity and attributable costs incurred by the IAA in 2022 with the forecast level of activity and determined costs included in the performance plan.

Financial overview

Turnover from regulated activities in 2022 was €163.3 million (2021: €128.2 million) comprising en route revenue of €129.8 million (2021: €104.7 million), terminal revenue of €28.9 million (2021: €19.8 million), exempt air traffic revenue of €1.3 million (2021: €1.1 million) and other revenue attributable to regulated activities of €3.4 million (2021: €2.7 million). Operating expenses of €147.0 million (2021: €124.9 million) comprise costs incurred by the IAA air navigation service provider (ANSP) and the IAA air navigation services safety regulator/NSA in the provision of regulated activities. Staff costs were €76.5 million (2021: €66.7 million). A charge from MET Eireann of €8.2 million (2021: €9.4 million) is also included. Profit before taxation for the year was €15.8 million (2021: €6.0 million) with profit after taxation reported as €12.6 million (2021: €4.9 million).

En route and terminal service units

En route service units, a function of distance flown and aircraft weight, were 4,233,452 in 2022, an increase of 6.1% over planned service units of 3,990,958. Terminal service units in 2022, based on aircraft weight, were 169,966, an increase of 2.3% over planned service units of 166,175.

Outturn 2022 compared with determined costs in Performance Plan 2020 - 2024

Actual regulated costs in 2022 compared to determined costs, reported to the European Commission in compliance with the EU performance and charging scheme regulation, comprising staff costs, other operating costs, costs of depreciation and cost of capital for each of the IAA air navigation service provider (ANSP), MET Éireann and the IAA air navigation services safety regulator and NSA are set out below:

Actual staff costs of €72,521,000 were higher than the determined costs included in the performance plan by 2.3%.

Other operating costs comprise training, systems and equipment maintenance, spares, telecommunications, power and administration costs including rent and rates, insurance, security, building repairs and maintenance. Total operating costs were down 4.3% from €37,733,000 in the performance plan to actual outturn of €36,095,000. Included in operating costs is a provision for an impairment of an asset in installations in progress which is not expected to be viable following changes in operational processes and emerging technologies. The IAA has strong procurement and budgeting procedures in place with competitive quotes being sought on significant tangible transactions. Operating budgets are actively monitored throughout the year.

Depreciation costs were lower by 20.5%, from €13,281,000 to €10,560,000. The IAA has a five-year technology plan and a capital budget is approved annually. Scheduling differences will arise in the implementation of some projects.

Cost of capital was down 12.9% from €6,395,000 to €5,572,000 due to timing in the delivery of planned capital projects.

Overall, total IAA NSA costs were 0.6% lower than the performance plan.

MET Éireann

In 2022, the IAA ANSP recorded a charge from MET Éireann of €8.2 million. Costs for meteorological services are allocated 80% to en route and 20% to terminal activities. This allocation, agreed with the NSA, has been in place since 2001.

Reconciliation of actual regulated costs 2022 to operating expenses

A reconciliation of actual regulated costs in 2022 to operating expenses reported in the financial statement on page 10 has been provided separately to the NSA.

Inflation

In 2022, the performance plan forecasted an inflation rate for Ireland of 1.9%, consistent with the International Monetary Fund (IMF) forecast available at the time and consistent with the EU regulations. Actual inflation in the year was 8.1%.

Costs exempt from risk sharing

Costs exempt from risk sharing comprise EUROCONTROL subscriptions. The planned charge in 2022, included in the 2022 determined costs, was €7,429,587. Actual outturn was €7,420,363 giving rise to an amount of €9,224 to be reimbursed from the airspace users in future years.

Other revenue

In calculating the en route and terminal charges for 2022, other revenues of €0.7 million for en route and €0.7 million for terminal, were reimbursed to the airspace users through a reduction in the 2022 unit charges. Other revenues include EU funding which, in general, is reimbursed within two years of the funding claim being audited if the claim is for operating expenditure and in line with the depreciation profile if the claim is for capital expenditure.



INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT TO THE DIRECTORS OF IRISH AVAITION AUTHORITY

Opinion on the Financial Statement

We have audited the profit and loss account of the Regulated Activities of the Irish Aviation Authority (the "Company") for the year ended 31 December 2022 and the related notes on pages 11 to 18, including a summary of significant accounting policies (together "the financial statement").

The financial reporting framework established by the National Supervisory Authority ("NSA") is set out in the Framework for the 2022 IAA Regulated Entity Accounts to CAR (NSA) dated 21 April 2023 ("financial reporting framework").

In our opinion, the financial statement presents fairly, in all material respects, the profits and losses attributable to the regulated activities of the Company for the year ended 31 December 2022 in accordance with the financial reporting framework.

Basis for opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (Ireland) (ISAs (Ireland)) including ISA (Ireland) 800. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the "Auditor's responsibilities for the audit of the Financial Statement" section of our report.

We are independent of the Company in accordance with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statement in Ireland, including the Ethical Standard issued by the Irish Auditing and Accounting Supervisory Authority, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Emphasis of Matter- Basis of Preparation

We draw attention to Note 1 to the financial statement, which describes the basis of preparation. The financial statement is prepared to assist the Company to meet the regulatory reporting requirements of the Company. As a result, the financial statement may not be suitable for another purpose.

Our opinion is not modified in respect of these matters.

Other Matters

The Company has prepared a separate set of statutory financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2022 in accordance with FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland" issued by the Financial Reporting Council on which we issued a separate auditor's report to the directors of the Company dated 6 April 2023.

Other information

The directors are responsible for the other information. The other information comprises the information included in the Regulated Entity Financial Statement, other than the financial statement and our auditor's report thereon. Our opinion on the financial statement does not cover the other information and, except to the extent otherwise explicitly stated in our report, we do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

In connection with our audit of the financial statement, our responsibility is to read the other information and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the financial statement or our knowledge obtained in the audit or otherwise appears to be materially misstated. If we identify such material inconsistencies or apparent material misstatements, we are required to determine whether there is a material misstatement in the financial statement or a material misstatement of the other information. If, based on the work we have performed, we conclude that there is a material misstatement of this other information; we are required to report that fact.

We have nothing to report in this regard.

Responsibility of the Directors for the Financial Statement

1. Accounting policies

The following accounting policies have been applied consistently in dealing with items which are considered material in relation to the regulated entity's financial statement. These accounting policies are in agreement with those used in the preparation of the audited consolidated and company financial statements of the Irish Aviation Authority ("the IAA", "the Company") and its subsidiary undertaking (with the Company and the subsidiary being together "the Group") for the year ended 31 December 2022.

General information and basis of preparation

The Irish Aviation Authority ("IAA", "the Company") is a private limited company formed under the Irish Aviation Authority Act, 1993 (the "IAA Act"), and registered under the Companies Act 2014. During 2022 the IAA was responsible for the safety regulation of the civil aviation industry in Ireland, the oversight of civil aviation security in Ireland and the provision of air traffic management and voice communications services to aircraft operating within Irish-controlled airspace and halfway across the North Atlantic.

Pursuant to the Air Navigation and Transport Act 2022, the IAA was restructured from 1 May 2023 transferring the air navigation services functions of the IAA to a new commercial semi-State Company, The Irish Air Navigation Service trading as AirNav Ireland. The Commission for Aviation Regulation (CAR) was dissolved from 1 May 2023 and its functions were merged with the aviation regulatory functions of the IAA. In this respect, the Regulated Entity financial statement for the year ended 31 December 2022 will be last Regulated Entity financial statement prepared by the IAA.

The directors consider that the format and content of the Regulated Entity financial statement meets the requirements of the NSA as set out in the 'Framework for the 2022 IAA Regulated Entity Accounts to CAR (NSA)' dated 21 April 2023 ("the framework agreement") and comply with Article 12 of EC Regulation No 550/2004 and EU Regulation 2019/317.

For the purpose of preparing these accounts, the Regulated Entity financial statement includes the en route and terminal activities of the IAA. The financial results of other activities carried out by the IAA and its subsidiary undertaking are not included for the purpose of this financial statement as these activities are separate to those providing en route and terminal services. The basis on which turnover and operating expenses have been allocated to en route and terminal activities is set out below.

The regulated entity financial statement is extracted from the audited company financial statements of the IAA which is prepared in accordance with Financial Reporting Standard 102 The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland ("FRS 102"). The presentation currency of the financial statement is Euro. All amounts in the financial statement have been rounded to the nearest €1,000.

Judgements made by the directors, in the application of these accounting policies that have a significant effect on the financial statement and estimates with a significant risk of material adjustment in the next year are discussed in note 8.

True and fair view override

Ireland is a party to a multilateral agreement (EUROCONTROL) relating to the collection of en route navigation service charges. The IAA performed this function on behalf of the State during 2022, under section 47 of the IAA Act. Differences in income earned and eligible regulated costs arising from traffic volume risk and cost risk sharing are recovered from, or returned to,

users of en route and terminal navigation services, consistent with the underlying EU regulations, by amendment of charges in later years.

The costs to be taken into account for the purpose of the EUROCONTROL agreement are defined in the EUROCONTROL charging principles and in the EC Charging Regulations in a manner that includes all cash payments to pension funds. Consequently, the directors have determined that it is appropriate to incorporate all cash contributions made to the IAA's pension fund in operating expenses to the extent they exceed the pensions charge determined in accordance with FRS 102 'Employee Benefits', and to record an offsetting credit in the statement of other comprehensive income ("OCI"), in order to present a true and fair view of its comprehensive income and its assets, liabilities and financial position.

Separated profit and loss account

Turnover and costs have been determined on the bases set out below:

Turnover is the actual turnover of regulated activities as described below.

The IAA's cost base reporting system records cost by nature and by cost centre. Cost centres are attributed to business activities by location and then allocated by reference to the regulated activities of en route and terminal as well as safety regulation, North Atlantic communications and other/commercial other than:

- Interest income and expense on defined benefit pension assets and liabilities is allocated
 to the regulated entity on the basis of the proportion of regulated entity pension costs to
 total pension costs as per the cost base reporting system.
- Bank interest payable, bank loan facility fees and bank interest receivable are allocated to the regulated entity on the basis of the proportion of regulated entity turnover to total turnover.
- The deferred tax credit has been calculated on the basis of the proportion of the net book value of the regulated entity fixed assets to total fixed assets and the proportion of regulated entity pension costs to total pension costs.

1.1 Measurement convention

The financial statement is prepared on the historical cost basis.

1.2 Turnover

Turnover represents the amounts received, and receivable, in respect of services provided to customers, together with fees received, and receivable, in respect of statutory regulatory functions performed in discharge of safety regulation requirements.

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable and represents the amount receivable for services provided. Where the consideration receivable in cash or cash equivalents is deferred, and the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, the fair value of the consideration is measured as the present value of all future receipts using the imputed rate of interest.

Notes (continued)

1. Accounting policies (continued)

En route and terminal revenues

The provision of en route and terminal services are economically regulated activities underpinned by Commission Implementing Regulation (EU) 2019/317 of 11 February 2019 laying down a performance and charging scheme in the single European sky and Commission Implementing Regulation (EU) 2020/1627 of 3 November 2020 on exceptional measures for the third reference period (2020-2024) of the single European sky performance and charging scheme due to the COVID-19 pandemic. As described above, during 2022, the IAA was entitled to recover its regulatory approved eligible costs through charges to the en route and terminal airspace users. For the period 2020-2024, these eligible costs are set out in the State's Performance Plan for the Reference Period 3 (RP3) 2020-2024, approved in May 2022. Differences arising between actual revenues and expected revenues, as defined in the underlying regulations, are provided for in an accrued/deferred income account and are adjusted against income arising from en route and terminal activities. Accrued/deferred income is recovered/reimbursed by way of an adjustment to customer charges in future years, typically on an 'n+2' basis. In response to COVID-19, accrued/deferred income for 2020 and 2021 only will be recovered from the airspace users through an adjustment to customer charges, spread equally, over seven years, 2023-2029.

1.3 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost, less accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment losses. Depreciation is calculated to write off the cost of each fixed asset, including equipment purchased as part of installation, on a straight line basis over its expected useful life, at the following annual rates:

Buildings 20-30 years
Completed installations and other works 8-12 years
Office equipment 3-5 years

Assets are depreciated from the date they are commissioned for use. Assets under construction/installations in progress are carried at historical cost and are not depreciated until they are brought into use. The carrying amounts of tangible fixed assets are reviewed at each reporting date to determine whether there is any indication of impairment.

1.4 Leased assets

Operating lease rentals are expensed as they accrue over the periods of the leases.

1.5 Foreign currencies

Transactions arising in foreign currencies are translated into the functional currency at the rate of exchange ruling at the date of the transactions. Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies at the reporting date are translated into the functional currency at the year-end rate of exchange. The resulting profits and losses are dealt with in the profit and loss account for the year.

1.6 Taxation

Corporation tax is provided for on the profit for the year at the current rates. Deferred tax is recognised in respect of all timing differences that have originated, but not reversed, at the reporting date. Provision is made at the rates expected to apply when the timing differences reverse. Timing differences are differences between the Company's taxable profits and its results, as stated in the financial statement, which arise from the inclusion of gains and losses in taxable profits in periods different from those in which they are recognised in the financial statement

A deferred tax asset is regarded as recoverable and therefore recognised only when, on the basis of all available evidence, it can be regarded as more likely than not that there will be suitable taxable profits from which the future reversal of the underlying timing differences can be deducted.

1.7 Government grants

The Group recognises Government grants in line with the accruals model under FRS 102. Revenue grants in respect of expenditure are recognised in the profit and loss account at the same time as the related expenditure for which the grant is intended to compensate is incurred.

1.8 Employee benefits

The IAA provides pensions to its employees under four superannuation schemes. Three of these schemes are defined benefit schemes: "The Irish Aviation Authority Staff Superannuation Scheme 1996" – for staff whose employment commenced prior to 1 April 2008; "The Irish Aviation Authority Staff Superannuation Scheme 2008" – for staff whose employment commenced from 1 April 2008 to 31 December 2011; "The Irish Aviation Authority Hybrid Pension Plan 2012" – for staff whose employment commenced since 1 January 2012. For the schemes, the difference between the market value of the schemes' assets and the actuarially assessed present value of the schemes' liabilities, calculated using the projected unit credit method, is reported as an asset/liability on the balance sheet.

The amount charged to the profit and loss account is the total of:

- (a) the actuarially determined cost of pension benefits promised to employees for service during the year plus any benefit improvements granted to members during the year (current/past service cost), and
- (b) an additional charge to operating expenses reflecting the difference between the actuarially determined pension charge (current/past service cost) included above and total cash payments to the pension fund in the year, and
- (c) the net interest on the net defined benefit liability comprising interest cost on the defined benefit obligation and interest income on plan assets.

The difference between the interest income on assets and the return actually achieved, and any changes in the liabilities due to changes in assumptions, or because actual experience during the year was different to that assumed, are recognised as re-measurement gains and losses in the statement of other comprehensive income ("OCI"). The OCI includes an offset amounting to the additional pension charge, described in paragraph (b), expected to be recovered under the provisions of the EUROCONTROL agreement. The Company thus departs from the requirements of FRS 102 in order that the results comply with the requirements of the agreements under which its operations are governed and, in the context of these agreements, that the financial statement give a true and fair view.

7. Related parties

In common with many other government bodies, the IAA deals in the normal course of business with other government bodies and departments, such as Dublin Airport Authority ("daa") plc., Shannon Airport Authority Ltd, Electricity Supply Board ("ESB"), the Department of Transport and Met Éireann. In addition, in the normal course of business, the IAA transacts with certain Irish banks which have become wholly or partially owned by the Irish State. All of the IAA's transactions with such banks are on normal commercial terms. The ultimate controlling party is the Department of Public Expenditure, NDP Delivery and Reform.

In 2014, the IAA entered into a commercial arrangement to provide air traffic management training services to Entry Point North Ireland DAC, a 100% owned subsidiary of Entry Point North (EPN) AB, an associate of the IAA. Entry Point North Ireland DAC also provides air traffic management training services to the IAA on an arm's-length basis. During the year, the IAA earned revenue of €3.4 million (2021: €2.7 million) and incurred costs of €8.0 million (2021: €5.5 million) in transactions with Entry Point North Ireland DAC. As at 31 December 2022, there were no balances outstanding between the IAA and Entry Point North Ireland DAC (2021: €Nil).

Total compensation of key management personnel in the year amounted to €1.6 million (2021: €1.3 million) comprising salaries and other short-term employee benefits of €1.3 million (2021: €1.0 million) and post-employment benefits of €0.3 million (2021: €0.3 million). In 2021, in response to COVID-19, pay of key management personnel was reduced following the introduction, on a Company-wide basis, of a banded pay cut. Pay was restored for all employees on 26 November 2021. Key management compensation represents compensation to those people having the authority and responsibility for planning, directing and controlling the activities of the regulated entity. These include the board members and senior executives.

8. Accounting estimates and judgements

Key sources of estimation uncertainty

The preparation of the financial statement requires management to make estimates and judgements that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statement and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reported period.

Notes (continued)

8. Accounting estimates and judgements (continued)

Estimates and judgements are based on historical experience and on other factors that are reasonable under current circumstances. Actual results may differ from these estimates if these assumptions prove to be incorrect or if conditions develop other than as assumed for the purposes of such estimates. The following is the critical area requiring estimates and judgements by management.

Pension assumptions

The valuation of the defined benefit pension schemes is a significant estimate in the IAA's financial statement, particularly in the current uncertain market. The directors have reviewed and assessed as reasonable the assumptions made by independent professional actuaries in assessing the fair value of the defined benefit pension schemes.

9. Post balance sheet events

On 1 May 2023, pursuant to The Air Navigation and Transport Act 2022, the air traffic management functions of the IAA were transferred to a new commercial semi-State Company, The Irish Air Navigation Service trading as AirNav Ireland. The Commission for Aviation Regulation (CAR) was dissolved, and its functions were merged with the aviation regulatory functions of the IAA.

On 4 April 2023, the Board proposed the payment of a dividend of €5.3 million (€0.30 per share) (2021: €Nil). There were no other significant events affecting the Company since 31 December 2022 which require adjustment to, or disclosure in, the financial statement.

10. Approval of the financial statement

The Regulated Entity financial statement was approved by the directors on 8 June 2023.
